

COMMUNITY EDUCATOR LEARNING HUB

Over the summer we went through a pilot program with the ASU Community Educator Learning Hub. This is an incredible resource for a wide variety of organizations. There are hundreds of 10 minute interactive courses. Some are geared toward substitute teachers—like what they should do when they arrive at a school. Others are for industry visitors, about planning and how to ask good questions to students. One of my favorites is appropriate for parents about what math looks like in today's classrooms.

ALARMING DATA TREND

NEW DATA from the soon to be released Suicide and Self-Inflicted Injury Report and the also soon to be released Suicide Prevention Coordinator Activity Report (FY2024):

- indicates that professions falling within the
 occupational coding for 'Educator' experienced the
 second highest amount of deaths by suicide of
 any occupation in Arizona. The number of deaths
 by suicide place it as the only occupation in the top
 5 for males and females, being number 2 for both
 genders.
- Current, best reporting from Arizona Department
 of Education (ADE), establishes 109,333 educators
 working in and out of the classroom. Calculating
 the rate per 100,000 for 95 combined male and
 female Educator deaths by suicide in 2022, the
 rate of suicide for the Educator occupational
 category is estimated to be 86.9, the highest
 occupational rate in Arizona yet established.
- These new data are entirely unexpected, as national data show educators as one of the lowest risks for death by suicide of any occupation. Strategic planning is beginning to address this emergent threat in Arizona."

More information about these findings will be available soon. This is something only being found in Arizona, not nationwide, and is a major concern. Our office will be working with Arizona Department of Health Services and the Arizona Department of Education to see what additional supports can be brought into Yuma County to serve our educators.

YUMA BASED COHORTS

We have two great opportunities this fall for educators who don't want to leave town for professional quality training. The 18 month Beat the Odds Leadership Academy is getting started, with ten participants who will meet in person once a month and online another time each month.

The last two weekends in September are home to the Arizona Science Center's STaR program--40 hours of science teacher training with a stipend and \$500 in classroom supplies. This session is filled but we hope to offer it again, perhaps over the winter break.



ARIZONA DIGITAL EDUCATORS

New from Arizona Department of Education is a vast repository of resources teachers can use in all different subject areas. ADEL is especially great when you need something extra, like reteaching a concept that didn't quite hit the first time. It can take some exploration but we think there's a lot of potential here.

For example, we found a third and fourth grade writing project about pets. There's a full lesson plan, aligned to Arizona Standards, including ideas for scaffolding and extension activities.
